Cyber bullying and online harassment have also become major concerns, sometimes leading to severe psychological consequences.

Another growing issue is the spread of misinformation. Fake news, manipulated images, and misleading posts can easily influence young minds. Without proper media literacy, users may believe and share unverified content, contributing to confusion and panic. Thus, it is crucial to teach digital responsibility and critical thinking skills from an early age.

Parents and educators play a significant role in guiding teenagers toward a balanced use of social media. Setting time limits, promoting offline hobbies, and encouraging open communication can help maintain emotional well-

being. Governments and tech companies must also ensure stricter privacy controls and measures to curb online abuse.

In conclusion, social media is neither entirely good nor entirely bad—it is a tool whose impact depends on how it is used. When approached with awareness and discipline, it can be a source of learning, connection, and empowerment. But without restraint, it can easily turn into a source of stress and distraction. The key lies in achieving balance and using social media to enhance, rather than harm, one's life.

Teen Sleep and Screen Time

A 2024 report by the National Health Survey of India explored the impact of screen exposure on teenagers' sleep, health, and focus. The survey covered 3,000 students aged 13–18 years from 10 major Indian cities. Results revealed a sharp rise in daily screen time — from 3.1 hours in 2019 to 6.3 hours in 2024, with smartphones being the most used devices.

The study found that students using screens for more than six hours daily slept only 5.8 hours per night, while those with less than three hours of screen use enjoyed 7.4 hours of sleep. Nearly 65% of participants experienced daytime fatigue, 58% suffered from eye strain, and 48% reported difficulty concentrating during

studies. Doctors warn that late-night screen exposure suppresses melatonin, the hormone responsible for regulating sleep cycles.

Experts suggest following the 20-20-20 rule—after every 20 minutes of screen use, look 20 feet away for 20 seconds—reducing eye strain. They also advise switching off devices an hour before bedtime and engaging in physical activities. Several schools have introduced “Digital Detox Days” to help students build healthier technology habits.

The report concludes that managing screen time is essential to ensure better sleep, stronger concentration, and improved wellbeing among youth.
